Success with Telehealth!

Franklin and Michael are brothers with autism and a strong competitive streak.

Both boys have made remarkable progress this year in spite of the challenges of receiving services remotely via telehealth.

"They absolutely love their remote therapy sessions at CTC," says their mother, Cecilia.

Nine-year old Franklin's favorite activity is making slime for a chemistry experiment.

The activity helps him practice his hand-eye coordination and tolerance for different textures and smells. Younger brother Michael, who at age 6 is still largely non-verbal but making huge progress in speech therapy, also has a new skill: hugging his brother after years of avoiding any interaction. Franklin and Michael look forward to participating in each other's therapy sessions, too, where they challenge each other to do better.

Their mother, Cecilia, is grateful that CTC's services didn't stop when the pandemic started. "My kids have actually done better with telehealth," she says. "They are at home, so they don't get as easily overwhelmed. When they need a time out, they can retreat to their tent for relief or play with their familiar squishy toys." She recommends to other parents that they give telehealth a try. "I consider it a stepping stone to help build and maintain our connection to our child's therapist once in-person services resume."

StrategicPlanning

: 40th Birthday : Celebration

Children's Therapy Center celebrated 40 years of service to children with special needs in 2019! We hosted a birthday party at the Renton Pavilion in addition to kid-friendly parties at each of our four centers in Kent, Burien, Tacoma and Maple Valley. The birthday party on Saturday, September 21 was an opportunity to bring everyone in the CTC family together again – current and former parents and staff, board members, and community members invested in CTC. What a celebration it was!



Telehealth

As the spread of COVID-19 intensified in early 2020, CTC quickly recognized that providing in-person services would be impossible without jeopardizing the health of the children and families we serve as well as that of our staff. Our response was to shift to a telehealth model to deliver all of our therapy and classroom services. While CTC had begun exploring the benefits of telehealth prior to the pandemic, the onset of COVID-19 accelerated our timeline. Using Zoom and a laptop, our providers began offering telehealth virtually overnight in mid-March 2020.

Telehealth has transformed the way CTC delivers services to families by enabling providers to focus even more on coaching parents through activities and strategies they can use at home to support their child's development. While it's not a substitute for in-person therapy, we anticipate that we will continue to offer telehealth services in some capacity even after the pandemic subsides.



Program Highlights Equity

Did you know that of the nearly 3,000 children we served last year that 50% were children of color, 25% were Hispanic/Latino, and almost 30% are dual language learners? The diversity of the population CTC serves in south King and Pierce counties is remarkably rich. It is essential that we provide these families the culturally and linguistically appropriate services they need and deserve.

Several years ago, members of CTC's staff created a committee to evaluate our progress in making services more equitable and diversifying our staff and program materials. One significant result of their work was the decision to offer every staff and Board member the opportunity to attend a 2-day equity training workshop provided by King County.

Over the past year, the equity team has grown in membership and in its deep commitment to diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI) at CTC. The team supported staff gatherings last summer in solidarity with the Black Lives Matter protests; facilitated racial caucusing discussions among staff; and examined ways in which we can improve our outreach and communication to all families. As the pandemic unfolded, the team also studied the effects of telehealth on families of color and monitored services for signs of disparity in accessibility. We have added a Diversity, Equity and Inclusion (DEI) consultant to our staff to help us continue making progress in the future.



Who We Serve

The diversity of the population CTC serves in south King and Pierce counties is remarkably rich. It is essential that we provide these families the culturally and linguistically appropriate services they need and deserve.

Our Funders

In 2020, we saw our generous grantors offer relief funds and greater flexibility with expenditure of their usual gifts. This allowed us to adapt to the changing landscape as a service provider and support immediate needs.

To help CTC make the transition to telehealth and weather the pandemic, the Medina Foundation, the Liberty Mutual Foundation, the Rotary Club of Renton, Rotary #8 of Tacoma, and NW Children's Fund contributed an incredible \$56,500 in general operating and COVID relief funds, which has given us the flexibility to use the funds where we need them most.

Thanks to the generosity of our funders, between March and June 2020, we were able to provide over 15,000 telehealth visits to over 1,400 children with special needs, ensuring that these children could continue to learn the skills they need to be able to walk, talk, eat, play, and be ready for school.

The Power of YOU!




